Advance Copy of RoP Phases 2 & 3 & Updated Surveyor Guidance Released

On June 29, 2022, the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) released [QSO-22-19-NH Revised LTC Surveyor Guidance: Revisions for Phases 2 & 3, Arbitration Agreement Requirements, Investigating Complaints & Facility Reported Incidents and the Psychosocial Outcome Severity Guide](#). Surveyors will begin using this guidance October 24, 2022, allowing time for surveyors and facilities to be trained on this new information. It is advised to review this QSO in its entirety as it contains a multitude of areas of new and revised guidance.

Staffing Quality Measure Rating Changes with the July 2022 Refresh

CMS Post-Acute Quality Reporting Programs | Center for Clinical Standards and Quality

In January, 2022, CMS began posting new weekend staffing and staff turnover measures on Care Compare ([CMS memorandum QSO 22-08-NH](#)). These measures will be included in the Nursing Home Five Star Rating System methodology starting with the July 2022 Care Compare refresh.

In addition to existing measures of registered nurse (RN) and total nurse hours per resident per day, the new staffing rating methodology will include the following measures:

- Total nurse staffing hours per resident per day weekends;
- Total nurse staff turnover within a given year;
- Registered nurse (RN) turnover within a given year; and
- Number of administrators who have left the nursing home within a given year.

Each nursing home's performance on the staffing measures are converted to points, then summed and compared to thresholds to determine the staffing star rating. Additionally, to emphasize the importance of staffing, CMS will no longer add one star to the overall rating of nursing homes that have a four-star staffing rating. Rather, only nursing homes with a five-star staffing rating will be rewarded with an increase in their overall star rating.

The Agency for Healthcare Research and Quality (AHRQ) is seeking nursing homes to [participate in a pilot study](#) of the Workplace Safety Supplemental Item Set for the Surveys on Patient Safety Culture™ (SOPS®) Nursing Home Survey. The new supplemental item set focuses on the extent to which nursing homes' organizational culture supports the safety of staff in the workplace.

Nursing homes may be eligible for an incentive payment if they qualify for participation. If selected, participating nursing homes will receive:

- Free survey administration of the SOPS Nursing Home Survey with the Workplace Safety Supplemental Items to nursing home staff in July/August 2022.
- Feedback reports comparing their results to other pilot sites.
- The option to have findings included in the next SOPS Nursing Home Database.

Sundowning . . . Causes and Coping Strategies

It's common for people living with Alzheimer's disease to experience increased confusion, anxiety, agitation, pacing, and disorientation beginning at dusk and continuing throughout the night. Commonly referred to as "sundowning", this syndrome can disrupt the body's sleep-wake cycle, causing more behavioral problems late in the day.

Factors that may cause sundowning:

- Mental and physical exhaustion from a full day trying to keep up with an unfamiliar or confusing environment.
- Nonverbal behaviors of others, especially if stress or frustration is present, may inadvertently contribute to the stress level of person living with Alzheimer's.
- Reduced lighting can increase shadows and may cause the person living with the disease to misinterpret what they see and, subsequently, become more agitated.

Tips that may help caregivers manage sundowning:

- Get plenty of rest so you're less likely to exhibit unintended nonverbal behavior.
- Schedule activities such as doctor appointments, trips and bathing in the morning or early afternoon hours when the person living with dementia is more alert.
- Make notes about what happens before sundowning events and try to identify triggers.
- Reduce stimulation during the evening hours (i.e., TV, doing chores, loud music, etc.). These distractions may add to the person's confusion.
- Offer a larger meal at lunch and keep the evening meal lighter.
- Keep their surroundings well-lit in the evening. Adequate lighting may reduce the person's confusion.
- Take a walk with the person to help reduce his or her restlessness.
- When behavioral interventions and environmental changes do not work, consider a professional care consultation with the care team and an Alzheimer's Association care consultant.

NHSN Q&A's:

Q1: Does the resident identifier/ staff identifier need to be the same one that I use for the Point of Care (POC) testing results form?

A1: Yes. It is encouraged that you use the same identifier for individuals throughout the NHSN application, and that each individual has a UNIQUE identifier. Steer away from using date of birth, initials, room numbers for the unique identifier as there would be a good chance you could easily duplicate the unique identifier.

Q2: On the Event- Level (Person Level) Reporting for the Weekly Vaccination Module, how do I add a new health care worker or resident?

A2: Step 1: Click + Add Row button

Step 2: New yellow section at the top of the form will appear to enter this individual's data

Step 3: Enter required and applicable fields


Step 4: Click Save Row

Q3: On the Event-level (Person Level) Reporting for the Weekly Vaccination Module, if I enter incorrect data by mistake and click save, can the row be deleted?

A3: No. If data is entered and saved, the row CANNOT be deleted. It is recommended that you do one of the following:

- Edit the row/ repurpose the row with someone else's data or
- Change the discharge/end date to a date that is before the event -level forms can be used to submit data (i.e., before 3/28/2022). This way, the incorrect individual won't contribute to any data that can be submitted.

Note: if you do this, you should also change the name and ID to avoid confusion. Add a not to the "Comments" column on the far right to document that this entry is incorrect.

- Germs in stool can spread onto hands and skin when wiping or changing a diaper

Germs That Live in the Gut

- E. coli
- Klebsiella
- Candida
- Clostridiodes difficile (C. diff) E. coli






Infection Control Actions to Reduce Risk

- Hand hygiene
- Use of personal protective equipment (gloves and gowns)
- Cleaning and disinfection
- Textile management
- Waste management
